## INTRODUCTION

On another occasion a surly teenager was asked whether he had received everything he wanted for Christmas. 'No, I didn't get everything I wanted,' he mumbled, adding, 'But then it's not my birthday, is it?' We get so wrapped up in what the shops have to sell us that we can easily miss who Christmas is all about.

From almost the beginning of time God was getting the world ready for the first Christmas. The Bible tells us that when our first ancestors disobeyed God and introduced sin and death into the world, God distinctly promised that a day would come when the seed or offspring of a woman would destroy the work of the devil himself.<sup>1</sup> In the very phrasing of that initial promise is the beginning of a mystery that would become clear centuries later.
