It suddenly asks her, "You're crying. What for?"




















"Aha," says the cat. "Let me tell you a secret:

When no one can see, is surprisingly bad.




Look round the street. Mrs. Gubbins is rude.


The Macintosh children are always in fights.

Of death, and the devil, and let you go free.


"He watches your life. He makes all things work out.


He helps you make choices. He tells you what's true.

And that's why the hope comes from him, not from you."














"But to help you remember our first conversation,

Note to Parents:

This book is based on the Heidelberg Catechism, a Christian document that was written in Germany in 1563. It takes the form of a series of questions and answers on Christian belief, based mostly around the Apostles' Creed, the Ten Commandments, and the Lord's Prayer. Its most famous section comes at the very beginning, and this is the basis for Sophie's conversation with the Heidelberg cat:

Q1. What is your only comfort in life and in death?

A1. That I am not my own, but belong—body and soul, in life and in death—to my faithful Savior, Jesus Christ. He has fully paid for all my sins with his precious blood, and has set me free from the tyranny of the devil. He also watches over me in such a way that not a hair can fall from my head without the will of my Father in heaven; in fact, all things must work together for my salvation. Because I belong to him, Christ, by his Holy Spirit, assures me of eternal life and makes me wholeheartedly willing and ready from now on to live for him.
