



Once, something that might seem impossible really happened.




He was still God, but he was also a real baby who cried and made messes and had to learn to crawl and walk. This was not what anyone expected.













And he told Joseph the baby's name: Jesus, which means, "God Saves." When Joseph woke up, he thought about what the angel had told him. Then he said, "Okay."



- Suddenly, an angel was standing there with them, shining glory like light. It was so amazing and so scary.








That news was so special and good that immediately the sky was filled with angels all singing and laughing and celebrating, and the shepherds saw it all.



When it was over and the shepherds were alone again, their eyes still flashing with heavenly lights and their ears ringing with angel voices, they looked at each other and






Unexpected Gift is made up of a storybook and an activity book. Each can be used separately, though they work best together and fully integrate with each other. There are 25 pages in the storybook, 25 activities in the activity book, and 25 ornaments to create.

The Storybook

The storybook tells about the Incarnation and how each of the main characters responds to it. Because it has 25 pages that correspond with the projects in the activity book, you can read the storybook all at once or a day at a time. Or both!

The Activity Book

As we learn in the storybook, the Christmas story is all about the Incarnation—God coming into the real, physical world and becoming part of it. That's why the activity book is just as important as the storybook: it makes the observation of Advent (waiting for the celebration of Christmas) hands-on and tangible. Making an actual thing every day will help you reflect on how God made himself a physical being for us. Each project corresponds with the storybook page and ornament for that day.



The Ornaments

Also found in the activity book, each ornament has one verse that links to both the storybook and the craft for the day. Day by day, as you add them together, you will end up with a telling of the nativity story through Scripture. You can hang the ornaments on a real or paper Christmas tree, on a string to make a garland, on your refrigerator, or your window! Whatever works for you. We just recommend hanging them where you can see them. You're adorning your home with truth and it will be good to be reminded throughout the Advent season.
